With the kind permission of the Weld family it will be hosted on the prestigious Lulworth Castle Estate. Not only the estate, but much of the surrounding area is renowned for its beauty with many areas being sites of special scientific interest (SSSI), areas of outstanding natural beauty (ANOB) and situated on the world famous Jurassic Coast it is difficult to be able to facilitate an event of this size in an area such as this.

We therefore request that wherever possible, you leave the area as you found it. With a wish to return in 2019, we will only be able to do so if everybody plays their part.

It is a privilege beyond words to be able to use this site, and we must respect our hosts and their property at all times and for this we thank you in advance.



Line 1 (Front of Castle)

With the backdrop of the castle, this stunning layout is a sensitive area and an absolute privilege to be able to shoot in front of with kind permission of the Weld family, hosts of the 2017 European Sporting Championships.





Line 2 (Lake)

Moving east from the castle we find The Lake. This is adjacent to the Army firing range and has the backdrop of the Purbeck Hills and the stunning vista of the lake itself. An interesting line with a good mix of target presentations will be on offer.





Line 3 (Pigeon Clump East)

Remaining within the park itself, we have used part of the old pheasant shoot with a combination of targets below you and above you. Many shooters will have not shot in areas such as this with open ground and little to aid distance assessment.





Line 4 (Pigeon Clump West)

A few years ago there was a big storm that blew a number of trees over in one of the woodland blocks. Using some natural gaps in the hedgerows, with wide, open space behind, there will be some realistic game target presentations on pegs one and two. Peg three offers you a totally different perspective whilst peg four will give you a good combination of tricky targets. No massive distance will be used, but narrow window presentation will fool those who don't have a full range of shooting technique.





Line 5 (Park Lodge 1)

Shooting around the old keeper's cottage, this layout is compact and will offer those with less experience a good opportunity to shoot targets at mid-range. Designed to balance with its partner layout, it is important to shoot your best possible score if you are not going to suffer over this set of 50.





Line 6 (Park Lodge 2)

Probably our biggest set of targets on the whole shoot, where distance will be used as well as speed. Using natural cover available to shield the pegs from view from one another, it makes for a very natural and interesting combination of targets. For those of you who enjoy shooting longer targets, this will whet your appetite.





Line 7 (Paddy's Land)

A real good piece of countryside in the heart of the game shooting area. Having the difficulties of the sun on pegs one and two, you will be shooting targets below your feet. Turning through 180° for pegs three and four really sets this layout apart and will test you through a full range of abilities with the use across the line of speed, distance and angles, some interesting targets and spectacular views looking back towards the Army camp at Bovington.





Line 8 (Bellhuish)

A game shooters paradise! Using this high-sided valley and a combination of high, driven and crossing targets it is ideal for those who are used to shooting game. Situated to west of the castle, about a 10 minute drive away, it is important to make sure we arrive with plenty of time.
